Space Exploration Memorial (Update)

In previous issues of this newsletter, information has been provided about the vision of MRA to create a Space Exploration Memorial, in concert with the Marshall Space Flight Center (MSFC) and the U.S. Space and Rocket Center (USSRC). The memorial will contain engraved names of all federal employees who worked at Marshall beginning with the opening of the Center in 1960 through the present time. It will also contain the names of the companies that supported Marshall throughout its history. The memorial will be located at USSRC, where it can be visited by families, friends and the public. It will recognize the individuals and companies that have built the rockets and spacecraft on display at the USSRC.

A key element of the memorial is identification of names of all MSFC employees. A committee led by Sandra Turner and Gray Settle has been working to compile these names. These names have been entered in a database which is now online on the MRA website(www.marshallretirees.org). Please visit this website to verify that your information is correct and to add background information about your work and contributions. If you have specific questions regarding the database, contact Sandra Turner (sandraturner703@hotmail.com) or Gray Settle (gsettle@gmail.com).

Tax deductible contributions can be made on this site and will be held in a restricted fund of the USSRC Education Foundation for the creation of the memorial.

This database will be available on a kiosk next to the memorial that will also give the location of the individual's engraved name on the base that surrounds the memorial.

The space exploration memorial is planned in three phases based on contributions. The first phase will include the pool with the base engraved with the names around it in chronological order. The second adds fountain capability showing the relative total power of 5 major rockets that were built at MSFC. The third phase has multiple fountains showing more detail about the rockets including the engine layout with scaled size and thrust. This will be the only space exploration memorial that exists in the world containing the names of those who designed and built these major rockets and spacecraft that have been the heart of America's space program.

Space Exploration Memorial Employee Data Base Subcommittee



The committee to develop the list of all past and present Marshall employees (1960 – present time) has been hard at work since February, attempting to locate an official list only to find that one doesn't exist. However, they were able to obtain partial lists from different sources including UAH Archives, MSFC phone books, Human Resources, NASA Headquarters Applications Office and personal knowledge of committee members and MRA. So far, 21,000 names have been collected and the search continues. There are handwritten cards on each employee that started to work from 1960 to 1974, before automation. Five committee members gained access to the cards that contain PAI. They began the tedious task of going through the cards, searching for new names and double checking the accuracy of names already collected. They have completed the task of reviewing approximately 11,000 cards that yielded 3,400 new names. Six members continue to go through phone books and are finding additional names.

A kiosk containing the database was set up at USSRC in time for the 50th Anniversary celebration. Visitors could look up names to ensure employees they know were included. Business cards were given out with the MRA new website giving them the opportunity to add information, photos, and bios, if desired.

The sub-committee is led by Sandra Turner. National Space Club Recognizes Jack Lee

The National Space Club has served as host of the annual von Braun Memorial Dinner for 31 years. Jack Lee served as President of the Board of the National Space Club for many years and chaired its von Braun Memorial Dinner Awards Committee for a number of years. He played a crucial role in establishing the von Braun Symposium, the nation's premier gathering of leaders from government, industry and academia to discuss key issues in space exploration. To perpetually remember and honor his lifetime of leadership and service to the community, the Community Service Award has been renamed the Jack Lee Service Award.

National Space Club Presents Astronautics Engineering Award to Brooks Moore



Brooks Moore with Hoot Gibson, Master of Ceremonies

Brooks Moore was awarded the Astronautics Engineering Award for his outstanding contributions to U. S. leadership in the field of rocketry and astronautics, including key technical and leadership roles with the historic Redstone, Jupiter and Saturn launch vehicle programs. He was one of the first young American engineers hired to work with von Braun and his key specialists from Germany. With Brooks directing the design of the guidance and control systems, the team developed the missile, named Jupiter. He also helped with the first American satellite and the team launched Explorer 1 in 1958. In 1969, Brooks was selected to become Director of Astronautics Laboratory, making him one of only two American engineers to become a laboratory director.

A few days each week, Brooks can be found at the USSRC, volunteering as a docent.

Spacelab Semi-Annual Reunion held in October 2019



Statement from Bill Lokken:

These people should be proud of what they achieved on the Spacelab program on which they dedicated many years of their working lives. These folks took an unproven manned spacecraft and turned it into a platform that could safely perform serious, multidiscipline science investigations in a comfortable environment for humans. It was a forerunner of Space Station. They developed the processes and methods for integrating science instruments, some of which were proprietary, into a flight vehicle and operating them safely with minimum crew time and with all the constraints that spaceflight entails. The experience and talent of this group are immeasurable. These folks managed 36 Spacelab flights over 17 years, a fantastic record! That is certainly a record that will forever bind this team together.

UAH's Apollo Archives Vital to Researchers

Focus, the magazine of UAH, recently featured an article about Reagan Grimsley, the Louis Salmon Library's head of special collections and archives, and his work involving space history.

As part of the 50th Anniversary celebration of the moon landing, Reagan and his staff held an open house to introduce the public to the work they are doing to preserve the documents from the Apollo era. The collection includes files from Dr. Lundquist, Dr. Stuhlinger, David Christiansen, Konrad Dannenberg, and Rep. Bob Jones, to name a few. MRA members are encouraged to make arrangements to have their collections donated to UAH. The library is open to the public to conduct space history research.
